

DISCOVERY OF NEW WOODMAN POINT DOCUMENTS AND MAPS

A recent visit to the State Archives by vice president Neil Wilson uncovered some previously unseen documents relating to the Woodman Point Quarantine Station. Whilst Friends has regularly and exhaustively scoured the collection of historical documents held by the National Archives of Australia for the post-Federation period, we had not systematically checked the collections at the State Archives, which holds documents pertaining to the colonial (pre-Federation) period of our State's history.

Although there was not an abundance of documents, those discovered were more than revealing. For the first time we were able to determine the exact location of the original Station jetty, built circa 1886, and the pathway of the tramline running from the jetty into the Doctors' Precinct.

Little is known about this jetty, but we now know that it was located to the north north-west of what is now the Bertie Poore Room within the Doctors' Precinct. Based on the scale of the map, it is estimated that the jetty was a mere 200 feet (60m) long. Furthermore, based on the dates of the maps, it appears that this original jetty was still in existence when the second jetty (1901 -1979) was constructed



Further research since has not uncovered more information about this first jetty. It seems that no specific tender was called for its construction, and it was not listed as part of the usual tender process called in *The West Australian* on 28 March 1885 for the construction of quarantine station buildings.


The location and titles of a range of other quarantine buildings were also clearly

visible on the maps. These included wards adjacent to the Plague Hospital, a disinfecting house, the isolation cottage, the leper's hut, several latrines, the cattle and horse stables and the two original tramlines running into the quarantine precinct from both the first and second jetties. Even the location of the Station's sole telephone box was clearly marked.

In addition, we have been able to access three sketches drawn by Jim Poore (1926 - 2018), son of Quarantine Station nurse Bertie and Babs Poore from his recollections when living and growing up at Woodman Point. They are very detailed and extensively annotated, providing a valuable insight into the location of sites and precincts within the Quarantine Station that may not be in existence today.

Jim's sketches cover three main areas:

- the area to the east of the officer-in-charge's house;
- the central precinct of the Quarantine Station; and
- the jetty precinct and adjoining buildings.

Details such as the location of the tramline running the entire length of the jetty and the existence of stables, carriage sheds, incinerators and even the old jail are clearly identified on the sketches.

These documents have provided a wealth of detail and information to further our historic interpretation of the site and Friends are very grateful for the assistance from the State Archives and the family of Jim Poore for providing access to these documents. They will no doubt be immensely helpful as Friends begins preparations for the special project, planned for unveiling as part of their 25th anniversary celebrations in 2026.

THE PASSING OF SANDRA PLAYLE

One of Friends' great supporters and one of Australia's foremost authorities on local military history, Sandra Playle, sadly passed away on 10 August 2025.

Sandra has long been a great supporter of our interpretative work at Woodman Point and of all things military. She was a



regular visitor to the Isolation Hospital and reveled in the growth and development of our group's efforts to honour and preserve the history of the Quarantine Station and especially, to tell the stories of the site's involvement in Australia's military history. It was only earlier this year that Sandra presented Friends with a framed tribute to Sergeant

Martin O'Meara, who spent time in quarantine at Woodman Point during the Spanish flu pandemic in 1918. The framed tribute, on display in the Nurses' Day Room, included photos of Sgt O'Meara, his medals and his headstone at Karrakatta Cemetery.

Sandra devoted more than 25 years to the meticulous research of Australian, and particularly Western Australian, military history as well as international military history pertaining to Australia's role in world conflicts. She was always a proactive voice to ensure all aspects of Australian military history were remembered and publicly acknowledged and her work resulted in the enhancement of national records pertaining to deceased Australian soldiers, particularly those who served in WWI. This work led to the establishment of military databases for use by Australian citizens interested in researching their own family connections.

The compilation of the WA First AIF Enlistments database, containing more than 34 000 WA enlistees, was one of Sandra's greatest achievements. She conceptualised the project and the methodology for both researching and presenting the data and led a team of more than 20 people who complied, edited and proofed the information. This work was the basis for ensuring the accuracy of data held by preeminent agencies such as the Australian War Memorial and the Army Museum of WA. Both institutions consulted Sandra over aspects of their records and acknowledged her meticulous research by making changes and alterations to the biographical and military data they hold.

An author and co-author of several military history books, Sandra also

complied military personnel databases for townships such as Albany, Broomehill, Mandurah, Meekatharra, Pinjarra, Sandstone and Tambellup. These databases, like all of Sandra's research, were made freely available to the general public.

Sandra was the proactive voice that ensured all aspects of Australian military history was remembered and publicly acknowledged. She never shirked a "fight" and doggedly pursued any cause she believed in. Sandra's efforts, as a result of her liaison with the British-based Victoria Cross Trust Organisation, saw recognition of VC graves around the world. But in particular, she held most dear the in-perpetuity care of the grave of WA VC winner Hugo Throssell at Karrakatta Cemetery, the direct result of Sandra's intervention and dogged pursuit of bureaucracy.

As a result of her work, Sandra was nominated for a *Pride of Australia* award in 2013, was chosen as an Ambassador for *Fallen Diggers* 2013 – 2014 and was a committee member for Friends of Anzac Cottage for a period of six years.

Sandra was driven to not only ensure that our military history was remembered by future generations, but that it was both correct and complete. She thought nothing to drive around the State at her own expense to research firsthand some minor aspect of military history that she believed to be incorrect, or to be the guest speaker at a local school to ensure "the story and the legend" lived on.

Sandra Playle exemplified the quiet Australian who loved her country, took pride in its history and wanted to share this history with her fellow Australians ... but only if it was correct and complete.

Only time will truly reveal the huge debt that our community owes Sandra Playle. Friends is honoured to count Sandra as "our friend" and to acknowledge her outstanding contributions to our local and national history.

FROM THE PAGES OF HISTORY

Continuing a series of articles recalling some of the patients who were nursed and cared for at the Woodman Point Quarantine Station.

Albert Wonesford Ding 1876 - 1918

A chance comment in a recent email received by Friends has connected our group to yet another descendant of a soldier from HMAT *Boonah*. Pam Waterhouse from Grafton NSW was on a holiday visiting WA and wanting to learn more about her late grandfather, Albert Ding who had returned to Australia on HMAT *Boonah* in December 1918.

Born in Goolwa SA on 7 March 1876, Albert was one of four children born to William Ding and his wife Mary Catherine Ding nee Sweetman. Albert had shifted to Western Australia where he had married Wilhelmina Annie Gramkie in East Fremantle in 1904 and went on to have three children

When World War I broke out, the family were living in Beverley where Albert was working as a commission agent, having never previously served in the armed forces. Obviously drawn by the nation's needs for reinforcements towards the end of the war, Albert enlisted to serve his country in April 1918 and joined the Western Australian 3rd Reinforcement on 17 July 1918, aged 42 years. His unit embarked from Fremantle on board HMAT *Boonah* on 29 October 1918, bound for the Western Front.

With the end of the war and the Armistice on 11 November 1918, the need to continue to Europe no longer existed and, after its arrival in Durban South Africa, the *Boonah* was instructed to reprovision and return to Australia. Sadly, during the soldiers' furlough in Durban and the reprovisioning of the vessel, pneumonic influenza or, as it was more commonly known: Spanish flu, was taken onboard the *Boonah* and, in the close quarters on the ship, spread rapidly during the return voyage to Fremantle.

On its arrival on 11 December 1918, Albert was one of the unit's troops inflicted with the disease. He was quarantined at Woodman Point on 12 December 1918 and sadly passed away the following day. His remains were buried at the East Rockingham Cemetery on 14 December, but were reinterred in January 1920 at the Karrakatta Cemetery.

When tour coordinator Jenni Carder realised that Pam was descended from a

Boonah soldier, she made arrangements for a private visit to Woodman Point and the Isolation Hospital. For Pam, it was all a moving experience, especially when she came across Albert's name and

service record on display. We were delighted to receive a painting of Albert Ding for our photographic collection from Pam and even more thrilled when Pam announced she would like to



become a member of Friends. And so, in this edition of Pratique, Friends honour the service of Albert Wonesford Ding.
